But I soon realized that my unusual amount of pride and pleasure comes from something deeper than that.

Having been born and raised where the everyday life of the local community was dominated by Monticello, Jefferson's mountain top home, and the imposing rotunda of "his university," my growing-up years were filled with reminders of his words and deeds, undoubtedly hard-wiring my unconscious mind for the rest of my life. Karin's determination that the opinions of conservative women deserved to be heard along with the opinions of others, exemplified for me Jefferson's sworn, "eternal hostility against any form of tyranny over the mind of men" (or women!). And it was obvious to me that she held firm to the same belief as Jefferson that "difference of opinion leads to enquiry, and enquiry to truth."

Thomas Jefferson's love of books has been well documented and often quoted: "I cannot live without books." So, I am sure he would not only be proud that NeW was founded at his university, but also would take great personal delight in the fact that this outstanding, and now a national organization, had its humble beginnings as a book club.


On September 24, NeW at the University of Virginia met for networking and a study break at Bodo's Bagels.



It was an energizing weekend, providing inspiration and practical training for young conservative female leaders. This was a chance for top NeW leaders to gain the practical skills they need to run effective chapters.
