Dear Friends,

In the last year, we celebrated Justice Amy Coney Barrett becoming the fifth woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court and more conservative women than ever elected to Congress. We've hosted Zoom interviews with five of these newly elected conservative women leaders.

Despite this success, conservative women continue to be attacked. The Left tries to silence conservative women everywhere — from campus to Congress. To fight back, the Network of Enlightened Women deemed 2021 "The Year of the Conservative Woman."

By highlighting conservative women leaders, we are changing the perception of what it means to be a conservative woman and inspiring more women to speak out. Thank you for investing in the young women of NeW. Together, we are educating, equipping, and empowering American leaders who will preserve and uphold our nation's founding principles for years to come.



Charlotte Townsend serves as a Press Assistant and Legislative Correspondent on Capitol Hill, getting offered the job before she even graduated because of her stellar credentials. She attended a NeW event before she stepped foot on campus, and we have been pleased to help her advance in college and in her career each step of the way — providing her with critical professional opportunities. This is Charlotte's story.

Charlotte attended the NeW Leadership Retreat in 2017, the summer after graduating from high school. At Retreat, she met two women who attended the College of Charleston, where she was starting in the fall. They left the Retreat inspired by the work NeW was doing and started a chapter on campus that semester.



As a chapter founder, leader, and president, Charlotte brought prominent speakers to campus including then-State Representative Nancy Mace (now Congresswoman Mace), Congressional candidate Kathy Landing, and Ellen Weaver,

President and CEO of the Palmetto Promise Institute. Under Charlotte's leadership, her chapter was awarded Chapter of the Year in 2019 and the Equipping Event of the Year in 2020 for our top Professional Development event.

Since starting her chapter, NeW has helped Charlotte advance professionally. Charlotte wrote an essay that was featured in NeW's book, *She's Conservative: Stories of Trials and Triumphs on America's College Campuses*. NeW placed Charlotte's first op-ed in *The Federalist*, which led to placing two more in *The State* and the *Washington Examiner*. NeW even arranged her first interview on *Fox & Friends*. Charlotte attended the NeW Leadership Retreat four times, the NeW National Conference three times, and CPAC on scholarship from NeW three times.

When asked about how she has benefited from NeW, she said: "I attribute my professional growth over the past few years to NeW. Being a Chapter Leader has really shaped me into being an effective leader, on campus and in the community."

Two years ago, NeW recommended her to attend the inaugural class of The Heritage Foundation's Rising Leaders Fellowship. She shined, and as a result, was accepted into Heritage's prestigious internship program last summer. During college, Charlotte, also interned with Senator Tim Scott and was the NeW Communications Intern during the fall 2020 semester.

A semester before graduating, she was offered a position as a Press Assistant for a Congressman on Capitol Hill and less than six months into the job she was promoted to Press Assistant and Legislative Correspondent. She attributes her experience with NeW to getting this dream position. Charlotte said,

"I am ever-thankful for Network of enlightened Women, and the programs and opportunities it offers. I am even more so thankful for the network it creates in a world where conservative women need to empower each other and build each other up."

It is an honor to promote women like Charlotte, walking with them on campus and in their careers.





This spring, when NeW at the University of Florida came under fire from the university for co-hosting a cookout event with other conservative groups on campus, the Liberty Justice Center stepped in and provided legal advice to the chapter as they worked to fight the chapter's suspension.







The NeW Essay Contest




Professional Network

With NeW women graduating and entering the workforce, it is important that their relationship with NeW and conservatism does not stop after graduation. The NeW Professional Network fills this gap by providing young conservative professionals with the opportunity to connect with like-minded women in a welcoming, enriching, and fun environment. The mission of the network is to give conservative women a space to come together, deepen existing relationships, and learn new skills.

Due to pandemic restrictions in most cities, Professional Network programming primarily took place online this spring.
