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Conservative women are serving in Congress, running

Conservative women are serving in Congress, running businesses, excelling across different industries, raising up the next generation of leaders, and volunteering in their communities.

This year, NeW is celebrating conservative women in leadership and the positive impact they have on our society. We are highlighting women as leaders in their homes, across their communities, on their campuses, and in their careers. Leadership isn't defined by a title, but rather by the impact someone has on others, their communities, and the world.

We're challenging all women to be leaders now in whatever their season in life.

While liberal women grab women's magazine headlines and make the front pages, they aren't the only trailblazers. Justice Amy Coney Barrett is the youngest woman and first mother of school-aged children to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court. Kellyanne Conway was the first female campaign manager to run a successful presidential campaign. Carly Fiorina was the first woman to lead a Fortune 20 company. Condoleezza Rice was the first female National Security Advisor to the president under President George W. Bush. Jeane Kirkpatrick was the first female to serve as U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations under President Ronald Reagan. And Margaret Thatcher was the first female British Prime Minister.



As part of our Lead Like a Lady program, Kathryn Alford, NeW Communications Director, hosted conversations with NeW chapter leaders and alumna to showcase how these women are leading in their sphere of influence. Pictured are her conversations with Gabrielle Wiggins, President of NeW at Florida State University, and Alexandra Amsden, President of



NeW at the University of Vermont. She also spoke with Emma Wilenta, President of NeW at The Catholic University of America, Erika Head, President of NeW at Oakland University, and Karly Matthews, NeW Alumna and Communications Director for the American Conservation Coalition.



To reach a wide audience, our quarterly Lead Like a Lady conversations are hosted on Facebook Live. In March, to highlight leadership in the workplace, Karin Lips had an engaging talk with Lisa B. Nelson, CEO of the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC), who shared ways young women can stand out in their careers as leaders. During the conversation, Nelson shared, "As a conservative woman, you should try to get your point across with a smile and with a calm demeanor as opposed to an aggressive forward-leaning posture."



As part of the discussion on leadership in our communities, Karin Lips hosted a conversation with Barb Van Andel-Gaby, Chairman of the Board of Trustees for The Heritage Foundation and trustee of the Richard and Barbara Gaby Foundation, in June on Facebook Live. Van Andel-Gaby shared how young women can get involved in good causes throughout their community.

Throughout our conversations with female leaders, we are asking the question, "What does it mean to be a leader?"

Their answers often reflect the idea that a leader is someone others turn to regardless of age or title. Leaders unapologetically stand up for what they believe in, even if their views aren't popular or they are standing alone. Leaders help other women, celebrating their success, rather than trying to push them down.

As part of this program, we are hosting quarterly conversations with female leaders, posting monthly social media graphics on policy areas that impact women, and talking with our young leaders through Instagram Empowering Chats.

Through this **Lead Like a Lady** program, NeW is promoting conservative women leaders and inspiring women to lead where they are today.

Bringing Conservative Leaders to Campus

NeW is proud to present a different perspective on campuses, encouraging the intellectual diversity that is often lacking in the classroom. One way that chapters do this is by bringing conservative speakers to campus who are experts in their field. This spring, chapters hosted discussions about free speech, socialism, terrorism, entrepreneurship, leadership, and more.


Exclusive event with Kayleigh McEnany



NeW LEADS THE CHARGE FOR CHANGE

Outdated occupational licensing rules hinder women in the workforce.



Outdated occupational licensing rules are failing women in America. NeW is working to do something about it. Karin Lips, President of NeW, is leading the charge to influence change on this important issue.

In states such as Tennessee, Maryland, Ohio, Missouri, and Maine, outdated licensing rules are making it difficult for part-time lawyers — many of whom are women — to remain in the workforce. Most states provide a way for lawyers who pass the bar exam in one state to be licensed without having to take another bar exam. And most states don't require full-time work.

Why making it easier to work part time helps women in the workforce

Tennessee can give women more opportunity in the workplace by reviewing how its licensing rules impact women.

March marks <u>Women's History Month</u>— a time for reflection on what women have achieved in the U.S. It is also a time to think about a women's agenda that gives women more opportunities to pursue the life they want to live. For many women, that means part-time work.

Women make up about two-thirds of voluntary part-time workers. In fact, about 1 in 5 working womenworked part-time voluntarily in 2016.



In addition to the expense of attending law school, most lawyers pay hundreds of dollars in examination fees, take intensive prep courses, and spend months studying before taking a state bar exam to be admitted to practice. Once lawyers have passed the bar in one state, most states provide some means for them to be licensed without taking another bar exam. But states can do more to alleviate this burden, especially as it affects part-time lawyers, for whom outdated licensing rules make it needlessly difficult to remain in the workforce.

Tennessee requires that lawyers be practicing full-time for five of the seven previous years to be admitted without examination.

Women comprise two-thirds of voluntary part-time workers. In 2016, about one in five working women worked part-time voluntarily. Around 30% of moms with children under 18 at home prefer part-time work. Additionally, women make up more than 70% of the 6.2% of lawyers who work part-time at law firms.

This spring, Lips wrote op-eds that were published in *City Journal* and *The Tennessean* about how outdated licensing rules are making it unnecessarily difficult for women in the workforce. These op-eds have sparked discussions with elected officials in Tennessee. NeW has filed a petition with the Supreme Court of Tennessee to change the rule. In response, the Court published an order soliciting written comments on the issue.


On March 25, Lips spoke to the West Virginia University Knee Center for the Study of Occupational Regulation (CSOR), a non-partisan research center that provides information about the extent, scope, and effects of occupational regulation.

She shared how she got involved in advocating for occupational licensing reform, what she has done to help remedy the issue, and the obstacles she has experienced along the way.

"The difference between a lawyer practicing full-time and part-time is the number of hours he works, not his expertise, experience, or skill. Often the hours gap is small. It is time to think about a women's agenda that gives women more opportunities to pursue the life they want to live. For many women, that means part-time work. States with a full-time work requirement should review their bar admission rules and remove the full-time work requirement for admittance without examination," said Karin Lips, President of NeW.

NeW in the News

NeW is pleased to be a resource for members of the media when they are looking for a female conservative student perspective and voice. This standing allows NeW the opportunity to support our women who are interested in pursuing a career in media or simply want to get media experience. Thanks in large part to their involvement in NeW, this spring two of our chapter leaders were hired by Fox News — Ophelie Jacobson, a former NeW Student Media Fellow, was hired as a Production Assistant for the Fox News Digital Team and Raegan Lehman was hired to be a Production Assistant for Fox News @ Night in Washington, DC.
