Occupational Licensing VICTORIES in Ohio and Tennessee!

outdated occupational licensing rules are failing women in America. In Ohio and Tennessee, outdated licensing rules made it difficult for part-time lawyers — many of whom are women — to remain in the workforce. Most states provide a way for lawyers who pass the bar exam in one state to be licensed when they move states without having to take another bar exam. And most states don't require full-time work.

In Ohio and Tennessee, however, lawyers were required to practice full-time to be admitted without examination.

Women comprise two-thirds of voluntary part-time workers. In 2016, about one in five working women worked part-time voluntarily. Around 30% of moms with children under 18 at home prefer part-time work. Additionally, women make up more than 70% of the 6.2% of lawyers who work part-time at law firms.

NeW filed petitions with the Supreme Courts of Ohio and Tennessee to change their rules. In response, both Courts solicited written comments on the issue. NeW women and supporters wrote in urging the states to repeal their outdated rules.

In April, the Supreme Court of Ohio joined the Supreme Court of Tennessee in removing the full-time work requirement.

NeW is proud to make a difference and support women having more work options.






Hope Harvard, Founder of Hope Beauty, shared the founding story of her makeup line and provided advice for aspiring entrepreneurs.





NeW is pleased to be a resource for members of the media when they are looking for a female conservative student perspective and voice. This standing allows NeW to support our women interested in pursuing a career in media or simply wanting to effectively make the case for their ideas in the media.



Ahead of the 2024 election, *Elle* magazine featured 11 young women who shared the moments during Donald Trump's presidency that helped shape their ideology today as voters. Only three of the women were conservative and all three were found through NeW. Katherine Mickelson, member of NeW at Baylor University, was one of the women featured. Despite ridicule from their peers, NeW women are courageously advocating for conservative values on their college campuses and challenging the narrative that all women must think the same way.



When *Glamour* magazine wanted to include the voice of a young conservative woman in an article on Gen Z and the election, the writer turned to NeW. We introduced her to Ellie Porte, NeW alumna from American University. The article, which features college-aged women with different political backgrounds, highlights some of the hostility Porte experienced as a conservative woman on her campus.


